## OVERALL SAFETY ASSESSMENT

RATING: □ Safe — tourist areas comfortable; standard awareness for scams and transport.

Istanbul is a safe city for solo travelers within the tourist-visited areas. Violent crime against visitors is rare. The city's real safety considerations are almost entirely about scams — taxi overcharging, the famous carpet/restaurant invitation scam, and exchange rate manipulation. These are irritants, not dangers, and all are avoidable with basic preparation. The historic peninsula (Sultanahmet), Beyoglu, Karaköy, Cihangir, and Kadıköy are all comfortable for solo travelers day and night. Istanbul's meyhane culture is one of the most welcoming environments for solo travelers in Europe.

The most important practical preparation for Istanbul: book the e-Visa before travel ([evisa.gov.tr](https://evisa.gov.tr), approximately \$50–60 USD), buy an Istanbulkart at the airport metro station, and use the BiTaksi app for taxis rather than hailing street cabs. These three steps eliminate the most common friction points.

## GETTING AROUND SAFELY

## COMMON SCAMS &amp; RISKS

Carpet shop / restaurant invitation scam:

The most common tourist scam in Istanbul: a friendly local (often near the Hagia Sophia or Blue Mosque) strikes up a conversation, claims to be a student or professional, and eventually invites you to his family's carpet shop or a restaurant where prices are dramatically inflated. The friendliness is genuine but the outcome is commercial. Politely decline invitations to shops from new acquaintances.

Taxi overcharging:

Street taxis near tourist sites sometimes use rigged meters or take long routes. Use the BiTaksi app exclusively — it shows the fare estimate before booking and records the route. The app taxi arrives in minutes and eliminates negotiation.

Currency exchange manipulation:

Some exchange bureaus near Sultanahmet show favorable rates but add fees at the counter, or count back change incorrectly. Use ATMs for Turkish Lira — the rate is better and the transaction is transparent. Count change carefully before leaving any exchange.

Shoe-shine drop scam:

A shoe-shiner drops his brush near you; when you pick it up, he insists on polishing your shoes and charges an inflated price. If a brush falls near you, just keep walking.

## HEALTH & MEDICAL

- Dial 112 for all EU-standard emergency calls in Turkey — police, fire, and medical.
- American Hospital Istanbul (Güzelbahçe Sok. 20, Nişantaşı) is the top private hospital for international visitors — English-speaking staff, international insurance accepted. +90 212 311 2000.
- Acıbadem Fulya Hospital (Fulya Mah., Şehit Ahmet Sk. 1, Şişli) is the largest private hospital network in Turkey with excellent emergency care. English-speaking staff.
- Türkiye Yüksek İhtisas Hospital (public): for serious emergencies if private hospitals are inaccessible.
- Pharmacies (eczane) are marked by a red crescent and widespread throughout the city. Many pharmacists speak basic English. Night-duty pharmacies (nöbetçi eczane) are posted on all pharmacy doors.
- Travel insurance with medical coverage is strongly recommended. Private hospital costs in Turkey are lower than Western Europe but still significant without coverage.
- Tap water is technically safe but many locals and visitors prefer bottled water. Bottled water is widely available and cheap (₺5–10 for 1.5 litres).

## SOLO WOMEN TRAVELERS

Istanbul is manageable for solo women travelers with attention to context. Karaköy, Cihangir, Beyoğlu, and Kadıköy are all comfortable and welcoming to solo women at any hour. The meyhane culture in Beyoğlu is inclusive and safe. Sultanahmet during the day is fine; the evening is quieter and less active. Unsolicited male attention can be persistent in tourist areas — a firm, direct 'no thank you' and continuing to walk is the standard response. Dress modestly when visiting mosques (covered shoulders, knees, and head for women). The historic peninsula is more conservative in dress expectations than Beyoğlu or Karaköy.
