Is Porto Safe?

OVERALL RATING

Very safe — one of Portugal's safest major cities for solo travelers, including women traveling alone

Porto is consistently ranked among Portugal's safest major cities, and solo travelers — including women traveling alone — routinely rate it as comfortable to explore independently, day or night.

Violent crime against tourists is very rare. The realistic risk is pickpocketing concentrated in the busiest tourist zones — Ribeira's riverside strip, São Bento station, and crowded Tram Line 1 — particularly in peak summer season.

Transport & Common Scams

Getting Around Safely

The metro is clean, modern, and safe at all hours. Tram Line 1 is safe but genuinely crowded in summer — standard bag awareness, worn in front, is sufficient. Taxis and rideshare apps are reliable and safe to use throughout the city.

Common Scams to Know

- Unofficial port wine 'tour guides' near the Gaia waterfront sometimes offer tastings at inflated prices — book directly through a recognized lodge instead.
- Restaurants around the most touristed stretch of Ribeira occasionally overcharge on unposted daily specials — confirm prices before ordering, especially for fish sold by weight.

Health, Solo Travel & Emergency Contacts

Health & Medical

Centro Hospitalar Universitário de São João is the city's major hospital, with full emergency services.

Tap water is safe to drink throughout the city. Pharmacies (green cross sign) are plentiful and can help with minor issues without an appointment.

Solo Travelers

Porto is a comfortable city for solo travelers, including solo women — its counter-style tasca dining culture makes solo eating unremarkable, and the compact center is easy to navigate confidently on foot.

Standard precautions apply on crowded trams and in the busiest Ribeira tourist pockets — otherwise the city center is comfortable to walk unaccompanied well into the evening.
